\$150,000 Bail Set for Trio In Fur Holdup

Three men were held in \$50,000 bail each by Judge Harold Canavan in Municipal Court on charges of armed robbery of \$42,200 worth of furs yesterday from Huerth & Huerth, Inc., 376 Boylston st.

Continued to Apr. 23 were the cases against Robert A. Donati, 24, of Marion st., East Boston; Anthony M. Zirpole, 27, of Leyden st., East Boston, and Christopher A. Brown, alias Frank Seccori, 48, no address.

Sgt James Dwyer of the robbery squad lugged three laundry bags of the recovered furs into the courtroom. He told the court the furs were found in a closet in a home on Faywood st., East Boston, allegedly occupied by Zirpole's wife, Sandra.

It was testified that shop foreman Arnold Green of Cambridge, Thomas Finn, 55, of Canton; Ida Vogt, 58, of Somerville, and Carl Huerth, 66, Edgehill rd., Sharon, were tied up by the fur gang.

The getaway car was spotted in East Boston, minutes later. Police had ticketed the car for illegal parking in front of the fur shop and officers had a description of ...

He termed the disturbances in the "nature of a tornado. No one in this community selected us for this assignment. It has been something fantastic and terroristic beyond man's thinking."

Hare did not specifically mention the Reeb case during his charge.

But he told the jury "you have on your docket cases that have gained national notoriety."

He said the "power of indictment within this county is within the province of the grand jury; not within the province of the solicitor, the circuit judge, the state or the President of the United States."

Reeb, a Unitarian-Universalist minister, was the father of four children. He headed up a low income housing program in Boston sponsored by the American Friends Service Committee.

Four men are charged with murder in the slaying of the Boston minister.

It would take 12 votes of the 18-member grand jury to return indictments. The jury could refuse to indict, thus erasing the charges, or ask for more time to investigate.

The grand jury convened yesterday. Circuit Solicitor (prosecutor) Blanchard McLeod said "quite a few" witnesses were called to testify. McLeod presented documents on a police investigation and a 200-page FBI file.

Selma police charged four city residents with murder. They were William Stanley Hoggle, 38; his brother, O'Neal (Duck) Hoggle; R. B. Kelley, 30, and Elmer Cook, 41. All were freed under \$25,000 bond each.

Among the witnesses yesterday were two ministers who were with Rev. Reeb the night he was clubbed, Rev. Orloff Miller, 25, of Boston and Clarke Olsen, 32, of Berkeley, Calif.

They refused to comment on their testimony because, Miller said, "we recognize the rights of the defense, too."
